"LLM in INTERNATIONAL AND EUROPEAN LEGAL STUDIES"

Regulation of the Academic Advisor

The School of Law of the University of Athens operates the institution of the Academic Advisor. The purpose of this institution is to focus on the students and contribute to their academic and subsequent professional career.

The Academic Advisor for the LL.M. in International and European Legal Studies students was appointed by the General Assembly of the School of Law (General Assembly Decision 17.1.2024) and is a Faculty of Law School member and LL.M. academic staff.

1. The Academic Advisor:

- Discusses and directs students regarding their performance in the LL.M.
- Informs students about the services offered by the School of Law
- Informs students about the professional prospects of the students after completion of their postgraduate studies.
- Informs students about Doctoral Studies.

2. In addition, postgraduate students can discuss with their Academic Advisor any topic of their academic life, for example, issues concerning the Regulations and Studies Programme (curriculum), queries regarding courses, teaching staff or even personal difficulties which may affect their studies.

3. Moreover, if requested by a Faculty of Law School member, the Academic Advisor may invite students at risk to attend a meeting in order to consider serious academic difficulties they face such as continuous absences, academic poor performance, etc.

4. The Academic Advisor shall make suggestions that are not mandatory without guaranteeing a priori solution for every problem.

5. The meeting with the Academic Advisor shall take place after making an appointment. At the meeting, the student's details are recorded and everything else that is considered to be important (e.g. learning problems, mobility problems, etc.).

6. The content of discussions is confidential and each student's record is subject to the General Data Protection Regulation and is confidential.
